Newman Police Support Follow the Dream's Monadelphous Mechanical Mob

Follow the Dreams Monadelphous Mechanical Mob is a program designed to help promote trades roles and related career avenues by allowing students to enhance their mechanical skills and gain hands-on experience in a fun and friendly environment. The after-school program saw a great level of success throughout 2019, however due to COVID-19 the 2020 program start date has been pushed back to later this year.

Upon return, Monadelphous volunteers and students who are part of the Follow the Dream program will get stuck into new and exciting projects, including the restoration of pushbikes, scooters and a small motorbike kindly donated by the Newman Police Station.

Senior Sergeant Jon Munday identified the opportunity after the unclaimed items were collecting dust at the Station over a long period of time, with the majority also in poor condition.

The Station saw the donation as a chance to support a great community project and to provide the students with alternative opportunities to learn new mechanical skills. The intent is for the bikes to be repaired and

donated back to the community going to children who don't have the opportunity to have a bike of their own.

Tim Cubitt, Monadelphous Branch Manager in Newman, collected the bikes from the Police Station and delivered them to the Follow the Dream house, where students eagerly awaited their arrival and discussed what tools they would need for the project.

As the students were wheeling the bikes into storage, two students, due to the uniqueness of one of the bikes, identified it belonged to their school friend - the bike was reunited with its original owner, who was ecstatic and appreciative for the return of his long missing treasured possession!

Students and volunteers are looking forward to the program recommencing post COVID-19, in particular now they have the chance to showcase their trade skills on the bikes and find them deserving homes.

Keeping it Local

When the COVID-19 pandemic started, local work increased in Newman.

"BHP wanted to limit the travel of people to and from the Pilbara – so for us it was a great opportunity to step up and complete work at short notice," explained Scott Risk, Manager at RSK Contracting in Newman.

RSK's services include earthworks, plumbing/dewatering, concreting and building at all of BHP's operations in the Pilbara, with their main focus on the Jiblebar Operations. They have a team of 16 people.

"We're a small company and we live here in Newman," said Scott.

"Being a Newman local, and going through the mining downturn not so long ago was a terrible experience, with a lot of stress and uncertainty for local residents and small companies..

"To see more local spending and engagement now is great. It means local companies can expand

and support other businesses and facilities within Newman," Scott continued.

Sport is important to a lot of Newman residents, with BMX, motocross, soccer, football and netball big on the agenda after work finishes for the day and on weekends.

"We have a great sporting community here, and spending locally enables local sponsorship and more people engaging with the local sports clubs. Being so remote, we need to keep these sporting clubs active and vibrant," explained Scott.

"In the past 12 months, I know my family has seen a big increase in the local spend and engagement, and there's more activity in the town, which is fantastic," said Scott.

"It would be great to see more people move to Newman and be a part of our fantastic community here!"

Home in East Newman

Newman Futures and Hames Sharley, an architecture, urban design, and landscape practice in Perth, were fortunate to work with Martumili artists recently, to learn about what home looks like in East Newman.

The full day activity took place on Thursday 18 June with regular Martumili artists and other Martu community members invited along for a day of conversation and creativity that helped the team to understand what East Newman is like now and what it could be like in the future. Participants shared their thoughts and painted what East Newman means to them. Western Desert Lands Aboriginal Corporation (WDLAC) Deputy Chairperson, Alistair Sammy also attended the day and helped to facilitate the conversation with artists in Martu language.

Twenty attendees were involved on the day, chatting, and sharing their ideas, with nine participants going on to paint pieces that depicted the area, what aspects of it make it feel like home and how it can be a stronger and more special place in the future.

Jeremy Edwards, CEO of the Shire of East Pilbara said "it was great to see so many Martumili artists involved on the day. As we, at the Shire, think about what the future of East Newman looks like, it is essential that we listen and understand what is important for Martu residents living in the area, and how together, we can plan to ensure it grows as a connected, vibrant and safe place to be".

WDLAC CEO, Tony McCrae and BHP Specialist Corporate Affairs and Community WA in Newman, Danielle Airton also participated and attended on the day.

The event was the beginning of a bigger project called "Home in East Newman" which will deliver a range of initiatives related to housing, landscaping, community services and amenity to ensure that East Newman is a safe and comfortable place to live. The project is being planned to ensure significant engagement and co-design with Nyiyaparli and Martu along with other local residents.

Danielle Airton, BHP's Specialist for Corporate Affairs and Community in Newman, enjoyed meeting some of the artists involved in the day. "Newman Futures is all about working together to build a strong community," she explained. "It's incredibly important that when we think about planning for what East Newman could be like in the future, that we listen and understand a diverse range of needs and experiences, of those people who call the area home."

A big thank you goes out to all the artists who were involved on the day, and of course to the amazing team at Martumili for their support in making it all happen.

So, as we just tick over the half year milestone, what a better time than ever to go back to the beginning to recap on what Newman Futures is all about.

Newman Futures is a project that brings together community groups, local businesses, government and industry together to work together on initiatives, explore concepts such as the 'future of work', and collaboratively work together to bring the community together, and support jobs and the local economy.

And although members of the four Newman Futures working parties haven't been able to meet up physically, they continued to meet using online video platforms in order to progress a number of priority initiatives.

One of the exciting projects being progressed by the Culture and Country working stream is the development of a compact which will invite signatories to participate in a new way of working together where all cultures come together as equals. Another project that the Liveability and Wellbeing workstream is progressing is a precinct plan for the revitalisation of East Newman. Over in the Education and Training workstream, a 'Get, Set, Go' plan is being co-designed that will outline what needs to happen to ensure local students are equipped with the knowledge and skills to find jobs in the emerging Industry 4.0 economy. And that's not all, there is plenty more being worked on, like the recent Stronger Business Futures event and the other work that the Economy and Work workstream group is doing to support and rebuild the economy post COVID-19.

There's a lot happening and still plenty of ways you can be involved. Whether you are part of an organisation with a focus in one of these areas, or a keen community member, you're more than welcome to join a workstream and join the conversation.




And if that's not enough, check out the interactive map to upload your favourite places around Newman - walking trails, camping spots, go to picnic places, or any other places you love!
